



### Fauntleroy Boulevard Project facing tough questions from business community

he Fauntleroy Boulevard Project, the result of planning that began as early as 1999 and approved by Move Seattle levy voters in 2015 is running into some tough ques-

tions. Project planners anticipated that the \$20 million safety and traffic improvements creating a new "gateway to West Seattle" would require a lot of explanation and have met with businesses, stakeholder organizations, and residents, taken feedback at community walk throughs and anticipate completing design work next fall with construction to follow.

But in the meantime, a lot of questions remain unanswered. While the need for safety and even modernization are obvious, access, parking and more are causing a lot of anxiety.

That's why a community meeting has been set for April 19 in the YMCA Rotary Room–3622 SW Snoqualmie St, Seattle, at 7:30.

The meeting sponsored by the relatively new Fauntleroy Way Neighborhood and Business Association will see SDOT and many people who understand the safety goals of the project but harbor doubts about the process.

They are seeking clarity on a series of issues, notably:

#### **Project design**

- Traffic studies. Per SDOT, a new traffic study was ordered. Our requests for an update have gone unanswered, to date.
- Current design completion. We were informed the design is now at 90%, but have not received updates from the SDOT mailing list, from SDOT directly, or how any traffic study may have impacted design updates.
- Treed medians vs. left turn lanes. SDOT indicated that they were re-examining addition-


#### al access along Fauntleroy Way in place of planned treed medians, but we have received no update, to date.

- Addition of crosswalks. Much of the justification for this project relates to pedestrian safety, but no additional crosswalks are planned. At our last meeting with SDOT, we were told this was being examined, but we have received no update, to date.
- Loading zones and temporary parking. Will there be any spaces along the street that allow for short-term parking, e.g. 3-minute loading and unloading.

#### **During construction**

- Construction worker parking. Given the squeeze on existing parking in the area, will workers be made to park outside the area of affected business to allow greater access by our patrons?
- Communication of the project to the neighborhood. What is SDOT's plan for communicating traffic plans to the West Seattle community? Businesses would like some say in the way this is communicated to help keep our doors open.
- Signage for businesses during construction. We've been advised by OED that this is normally not planned for. Given the extended duration of this project, we would like to reach a compromise.
- Pedestrian access. Will pedestrians have access to the length of Fauntleroy Way throughout construction?
- Mitigation. We have been advised by OED that the only mitigating assistance the City will provide to impacted businesses will be in the

and ongoing offense."

According to records filed in the case, the lengthy investigation by the Internal Revenue Service Criminal Investigation Division found that Galanti's businesses were generating significant revenues, but he failed to keep accurate records. Bank records show two of the restaurants had deposits of more than \$7.7 million between 2006 and 2011. While he failed to file and pay his taxes, Galanti enjoyed a lavish lifestyle: using forged tax documents to facilitate his purchase of a \$400,000 yacht; taking expensive trips to Hawaii, Las Vegas and the Caribbean; and paying more than \$10,000 for Kenney Chesney concert tickets.

"As we approach tax day, Mr. Galanti's

sentence reminds us of our legal obligation to file complete and accurate tax returns with the IRS. Today, Mr. Galanti, who willfully failed to pay \$800,000 in taxes, learned the consequences of neglecting his duty as an American and as a small business owner," stated Special Agent in Charge Darrell Waldon of IRS Criminal Investigation. "Instead of paying taxes, Mr. Galanti rewarded himself with lavish vacations and a new yacht.

His decision to ignore his civic responsibilities caught up with him today."

The case was investigated by the Internal Revenue Service Criminal Investigation (IRS-CI). The case was prosecuted by Assistant United States Attorney Norman Barbosa.

## Former owner of Admiral Pub and Alki Crab and Fish sentenced to prison, fined \$800,000

Failed to file personal or business tax returns for six years while enjoying lavish lifestyle

The former owner of three bars and restaurants in the Seattle area was sentenced today in U.S. District Court in Seattle to eight months in prison, one year of supervised release and \$800,000 in restitution for multiple misdemeanor counts of failing to file tax returns, announced U.S. Attorney Annette L. Hayes. Eric M. Galanti, 41, who now resides in Olympia, Washington failed to file his business and personal tax returns between 2006 and 2012. Galanti owned several restaurants during that time including Alki Crab & Fish in West Seattle, the Admiral Pub in West Seattle, and Bourbon Jacks (aka Poppas Pub or Charlies Pub) in Kent.

At the sentencing hearing U.S. District Judge Richard A. Jones said Galanti "enjoyed the lifestyle of the 'rich and famous,... but every single year when April 15th rolled around a light had to come on that you owed taxes.... This was a flagrant

## Save the salmon; what you can do to help

here's something fishy going on in Miller and Walker Creeks.

The waterways wind through Burien, Normandy Park and SeaTac—and adult salmon use them as a place to spawn eggs. Younger salmon use the creeks as aquatic highways, traversing the paths to Puget Sound.

But each year, a number of fish are dying before they are able to spawn. Volunteers are keeping count of how many salmon suffer from "pre-spawn mortality."

The City of Burien and King County teamed up to present the findings from the most recent "Community Salmon Investigation" in the Highline area to residents on Thursday, April 6 at the Burien Community Center.

Elissa Ostergaard, King County basin steward of Miller and Walker Creeks, said 31 volunteer citizen scientists spent months in 2016 counting the salmon in various locations on the creeks.

In total, they reported seeing 294 live fish. There were 68 dead coho and 43 dead chum counted-most were found in Miller Creek.

While there are a number of challenges to the salmon populations – like wildlife predators and winter floods that can wash eggs downstream, Ostergaard said chemical contaminants cause most of the deaths.

She explained that salmon are dying from pollution that enters the creeks—and about 60 percent of cohos are dying before they have a chance to spawn.

"There's a lot of roads and development, and downtown Burien is right in the middle," she said. "We've built a lot of infrastructure to keep the water from flooding. The thing is when the water goes into the gutters, it's not treated."

When water hits dirt and grass, it is naturally filtered before hitting the creek, she said. When rain goes directly from the roads, sidewalks and driveways, however, it carries with it oil, grease, chemicals, fertilizers, soapsuds and rubber from tires. Ostergaard said that the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration tested the effects of highway runoff on adult coho salmon, placing the fish in tubes containing the polluted water.

"Those fish were all dead in four hours," she said. "They filtered the same water, put adult coho in tubes and the fish were still alive days after."

She hopes to see higher numbers of salmon in the creeks—and fewer dead fish.

"With our habits and our pollution, we might need to do a little work to make it better," she said.

Mary Eidmann, Burien's stormwater outreach specialist, agrees that residents can help mitigate the problem by changing a few habits. She recommends building rain gardens and following guidelines for low impact developments.

Eidmann said a regional program "Don't Drip and Drive" encourages drivers to fix

leaks in the cars.

"All the oil that leaks from cars just goes straight into the water," she said. Participating auto shops in the program

in Burien are offering free leak checks and 25 percent off repairs up to \$50.

Eidmann also asks residents to try organic and natural gardening practices – and refrain from using pesticides and fertilizers.

"And don't wash your car in the driveway," she said.


Ostergaard is also looking for volunteers to sign up this year to count salmon. She said crews also gather to remove English Ivy, which is a major threat to the creek system. Construction has begun near Top Hat of a \$72 million 298-unit mixed -use affordable housing project called Southside by Vintage by Vintage Housing of Newport Beach, California. They bought property in September for \$4.3 million. It's the former site of Bernie and Boys Market at 11225 First Avenue South.

The company will get up to \$55 million in tax-exempt revenue bonds issued by the Washington State Housing Finance Commission. The notes will be placed by Citi Community Capital.

Inland Group out of Spokane is the general contractor for the project.

Southside will have four five-story buildings, some commercial space, parking on the surface and underground, a business center, bicycle storage and a playground.

In keeping with affordable housing goals, rents in Southside by Vintage will be limited to 60 percent of area median income, with projections of \$960 for one bedroom and \$1,327 for three. Twenty percent of the units will be reserved for people with disabilities and another 20 percent will be for large households. Eighteen units will be designated live/work.

**M**onths after the City of Seattle implemented Mayor Ed Murray's plan to dissolve neighborhood district councils, the city announced that the Neighborhood District Coordinators (NDCs) have been reassigned as "Community Engagement Coordinators" or will be transitioned into what the city calls "Strategic Advisor" roles.

According to an announcement made last week, four of the seven NDCs have become Community Engagement Coordinators.

"These Strategic Advisor roles continue to be defined, but will be focused on project and policy work across the city," wrote Thomas Whittemore, former NDC for Ballard (North region).

Whittemore is one of the four reassigned as Community Engagement Coordinators.

"I've enjoyed my time in the north and I am inspired by all of your community building actions! I hope to continue to cross paths with community organizers in the north and across the rest of the City of Seattle."

The city has assigned Laurie Ames as the

new "North" regional Community Engagement Coordinator (CEC). Ames is the former Central Region NDC.

"Laurie has a wealth of experience and expertise, and I know you will enjoy working with her."

The reassignment is part of a consolidation/ reformation program that was implemented by the city in March. The offices of the NDCs were moved downtown to the Department of Neighborhoods office.

"After months of discussions and negotiations, we are also now officially One Department. All our staff are housed in the same space, under one roof. This is new for the Department of Neighborhoods and we think the timing is perfect. Operating as one department will ensure that we can accomplish the abundance of meaningful and urgent work before us," Director of Seattle Department of Neighborhoods, Kathy Nyland wrote in an announcement.

## **O'Brien's audit of city's Incentive Zoning program** reveals errors, discrepancies amounting to \$3.7 million

Seattle City Councilmember Mike O'Brien received the findings from the City Auditor regarding the city's Incentive Zoning program last week and said that the report shows "clear problems" in the program that dates back decades.

"Two years ago, I stood with UNITE HERE Local 8, who raised concerns over missed opportunities for greater affordable housing contributions from hotel developments, like the proposed R.C. Hedreen Co. hotel in the Denny Triangle," said O'Brien.

"The findings shared today by the Auditor demonstrate that the complexities

of the Incentive Zoning program have left a lot of room for improvement in administering the policies. Now that we've identified the clear problems, it's time to correct them."

O'Brien requested the audit in order to identify and measure the public benefit of the incentive program. The program provided Incentive Zoning in Seattle to developers since 1985, which meant if they built affordable housing or paid into an affordable housing fund, they would be allowed to build more square footage.

The audit revealed some discrepancies in accounting and implementation, one

of which is that city departments have inaccurate documentation for projects that made—or should make—contributions to affordable housing.

The audit also revealed at least ten projects with developers who did not fully pay all fees associated with affordable housing agreements in earlier stages of the permitting process which amounted to \$3.7 million for affordable housing (including interest) in November 2016.

Furthermore the audit revealed other discrepancies in basic accounting for developers contributing to the affordable housing fund, stemming from the discovering that there is no formal process for the city to revise contributions to the fund when building plans change.

The audit also revealed conflicts and unclear elements in the Land Use Code related to incentive zoning which made the implementation of the programs "difficult."

Reacting to the audit pointing out the errors, the Planning, Land Use and Zoning Committee plans to revise the program. They will meet on Tuesday, April 18 at 9:30 a.m. Seattle City Councilmember Rob Johnson chairs the committee. SDCI and OH representatives, along with the auditor, will be at the meeting.

### **BURGLARY IN BALLARD**

The male suspect followed and they both hopped in an orange cab and fled. The suspect connected with police and told them the direction the cab was traveling. Police were unable to intercept the cab, however they were able to collect a few articles from the female suspect's bag that may lead to her identity.

#### MAN SHOT AND KILLED IN BURIEN

Police received a number of 911 calls reporting shots being fired near S.W. 136th St. and Ambaum Blvd., in Burien around 12:30 a.m. on Wed., April 12. When officers arrived to the location, which was outside of a convenience store, they found a man in the parking lot with at least one gunshot wound. Medics attempted treatment, but the victim, a 21-year-old Burien resident, was pronounced dead at the scene. Detectives learned that the man was at the store and appeared to be waiting for someone when at least two suspects approached the area, shot at him, then jumped into an unknown vehicle and fled.

Detectives are still investigating to see if this shooting is gang related or connected to

the Federal Way and Seattle homicides that occurred within hours of this shooting.

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## Bertha's big breakthrough

o much has happened lately that it's hard to settle on one single topic to discuss. But, for Seattle and its future, I believe the most significant story—surpassing an ugly, perhaps politically motivated lawsuit filed against the mayor —is Bertha's Big Breakthrough on April 4.

The five-story tunnel boring machine, nicknamed Bertha for the city's only woman mayor, began its journey from Pioneer Square to South Lake Union in July 30, 2013. Days before the launch, I donned a yellow hard hat

It's a queat place to meet! FINE COCKTAILS 4539 CALIFORNIA AVE. SW WE5-1966 and went eyeball to eyeball with Bertha, a behemoth idling in its Pioneer Square launch pit.

I snapped pictures and thought I would next see the world's biggest tunnel-boring machine sometime in 2015 when the 57-foot machine was due to emerge from a 1.7 mile Odyssey.

I was wrong, very wrong. So were many others.

During its four-year passage, Bertha was destined to encounter obstacles: equipment failures, overheating, cutter head burnout, work stoppages and soil and groundwater problems, just to name major impediments. Early in Bertha's journey there was a two-year hiatus while workers dug a 120-foot-deep recovery pit to access and lift the machine's cutter head to the surface for repair and partial replacement.

Once the new cutter head was installed in December, 2015, Bertha finally resumed tunneling. Workers stopped the machine again in January, 2016, when a barge hauling excavated soil damaged Elliott Bay piers and a sinkhole opened near the project site. There were additional delays for maintenance and inspection.

Meanwhile, Bertha's revised timeline continued to slip. As of today, managers figure the long-awaited tunnel will open early in 2019. The revised timeline—a 29-month delay—is only one unfortunate outcome; there also are cost overruns estimated at more than \$223 million. Needless to say, lawsuits to affix blame between the state and its contractors will follow, engaging attorneys by droves.

Although Bertha's journey is completed, the two-story tunnel remains some distance from completion. Ahead are another 1-1/2 to two years to finish highway decks, lights, ventilation and signals, followed by testing and work to attach tunnel ramps to connecting ramps at north and south portals.

All that said, the Alaskan Way Replacement project has reached its most important milestone. Speaking at the breakthrough, Mayor Ed Murray called it "a transformative moment."

It's daunting to look back now at where the city has been on the Viaduct Replacement Project. Following the March 1, 2001 Nisqually Earthquake there were half a dozen ideas about what to do with the badly damaged structure.

Early on, Director Grace Crunican of Seattle's Department of Transportation had favored digging a trench-like, cut-and-cover tunnel. That solution, however, would have shut down the waterfront for up to five years.

Some critics, like former Mayor Mike McGinn, simply wanted to tear the Viaduct down and rely on surface routes to transport 100,000 people each day. Other would-be visionaries argued the Viaduct could be retrofitted, a costly fix that would have produced a structure still teetering on supports sunk in watery soil and vulnerable to the next quake.

Washington House Speaker Frank Chopp imagined retrofitting the Viaduct as a glass-enclosed roadway with an upper level park, a version derisively dubbed the "Chopp-a-duct." Civic activist Kate Martin crusaded to save the Viaduct and turn it into Seattle's version of New York's Highline. But voters said no, apparently seeing the folly of an expensive, yet unfunded idea.

Among fanciful pre-earthquake proposals was one from a utopian planner who thought the elevated roadway would make an ideal venue for luxury condos. Herb Robinson, the Seattle Times editorial-page editor, imagined attaching a wide platform to the Viaduct's West side with pedestrian walkways, a shopping arcade, plantings and scenic viewpoints. Uncertainty about the Viaduct is mostly in the past. A well-vetted replacement project is now headed toward some critical junctures. Once Bertha's tunnel is ready to take on traffic and questions about tolls are resolved, the deteriorating Viaduct will be demolished and a wide surface road constructed. Work will begin on a nine-acre waterfront park partly paid for by assessing nearby stakeholders.

It will be well into the 2020s before that park becomes reality. But once dignitaries gather and ribbons are cut, Seattle will finally be reunited with the magnificent Elliott Bay harbor, grandest entry into any city in the world. Credit for that union belongs in large part to Bertha and her breakthrough.

form of access to construction updates and influence on project phasing and planning. We seek more clarity around this so that we can plan ahead to work together.

- Traffic re-routing plan. We would like any update available on the planned traffic re-routing during construction. Per the note on mitigation, our strong preference would be to keep traffic moving in both directions along Fauntleroy Way for the length of the project.
- 23rd Project. What has SDOT/the City learned from the 23rd Ave. project that will positively impact the Fauntleroy Way project?

To date, the project planners have only provided the most minimal of previews to suggest what the project might really look like on the ground. A top down "gods eye" view and some display boards to show what bike lanes and other aspects might look like.

The owner of RealFine coffee at 4480 Fauntleroy Way S.W., Julie Mierzwiak said, "We met with SDOT in early February to review the 60% design. At that time we were told that our existing on-and off-street parking would be overtaken by bike lanes and planting strips. We will be left with a narrow pass through for cars, but insufficient space for any cars to park. We also learned that SDOT is leaning toward moving traffic in one direction only-westbound, for the entire duration of the project (18 months). Without commuter traffic passing our businesses, we are very concerned for the viability of our businesses given this extended construction phase. We will also lose access from westbound traffic left-hand turns once construction begins. This has sparked much anxiety for us, as business owners and managers, and for our employees and their families.

We hope, but are not optimistic, that our concerns will have impacted the progress in design, but have not yet seen an update from SDOT."

Katie Trent in a comment on Facebook said,"Turning Fauntleroy Way into a Boulevard, and severely hamstringing West Seattle traffic for 15-18 months in the process, is an absurd project and an abuse of taxpayer dollars. Imagine if SDOT proposed reducing 15th Ave N.W. from the Ballard Bridge to Leary Way to one lane for 18 months, on the auspices that this roadway is the "Gateway to Ballard." The residents and businesses of West Seattle should have the same reaction to this project.

If you want to beautify the entrance to West Seattle, start with the completely unkempt brambles at the top of the bridge. Fauntleroy Way served 50,000 vehicles daily in 2015, and our community has grown significantly since then. While I am all for improving pedestrian safety, tearing up the street, choking traffic and access to business for over a year, and spending nearly \$20 million in the process when Delridge and 35th Ave. are in poor repair is irresponsible, at best."

SDOT in response said, "This stretch of Fauntleroy was selected by community members for improvements. While one goal of the project is to help create a gateway to West Seattle, the major goal is to better organize the public right of way to improve comfort and mobility for all users —whether they're walking, biking, or driving.

As for the other areas mentioned in need of improvements, SDOT's 35th Ave. Road Safety Corridor Project includes repaving, traffic signal modifications, pavement repair, and pedestrian and bicycle safety enhancements for 35th Ave. S.W. between Avalon and S.W. Holly St. Seattle Parks Foundation administers a community volunteer group to help maintain the area around the "Walk on Logs" statue as you enter West Seattle. The Delridge Rapid Ride project is looking at how to improve the streetscape of Delridge from the West Seattle Bridge to Roxbury Ave S.W.

The owner of Tom's Automotive, Kandie Jennings expressed concerns about access to local business since the proposed median will largely eliminate left turns. She also feels as if the project planners have been less than forthcoming. "We had some walkthroughs and they announced it was 60% complete and now it's at 90% complete and they are nearly ready to go. This is a big deal. I have concerns about the impacts on some of the newer businesses here." Jennings also was puzzled by the need for for the median to be so wide, and why two wide bike lanes are required when biking on Fauntleroy in certain sections is unlikely to happen. Drew Locke of West Seattle Brewing had other concerns including that the plan thus far includes a public sidewalk portion that crosses the property

line, cutting off part of his on street dining area. Locke said, "the MAIN concern for us is how far they intend (with the current plan anyway) to encroach on the sidewalk. This would mean complete removal of the patio we built on that

Fauntleroy side. Complete removal would mean, when we open our garage doors in the Summer, there would be effectively no barrier between our customers and passer's by. Instead of feeling "open" and comfortable, you would have a startle when I bake zooms 4" from your face, or some punk reaches your beer and sandwich and runs off! Firstly, this could be an issue with the LCB and then "boarding up" what was supposed to be a nice, open feel could be required.

Our conversations with members of the planning committee included our hope that could instead, reduce the depth of the patio, room for just one long bar rail along the fence, (approx. 3-1/2') as opposed to the 6-1/2' we have now for a bar rail and several tables. This would allow for us to maintain that open feel and remain compliant. Removal of the proposed bike lane in front of us which leads to a dead end effectively in our parking lot would create that required space. On top of that, we have a surveyor coming out to confirm property lines as part of their plan seems to cut into what we believe to be "our property." Effectively meaning half of our current patio is in the right-of-way, permitted as such; "rented space" from the city, but half of it is on our property.

The affects on neighboring businesses we believe will be much harsher, as we have a wholesale aspect in our business model, including a second location on Alki which we can "sell beer to" and maintain retail margins far from from the chaos that will become Fauntleroy. If biz does slow down dramatically, we can simply start selling

more beer to the bars and restaurants around WS as we would then finally have the product to do so. Where as now, we have to decline many of those establishments as we're selling most all the beer we can make in our Pub. Our concern there is that losing any number of these neighboring businesses will "remove" this community of businesses of which we are a part and take pride in. In our opinion, we need MORE small businesses around, not MORE condos, etc."

The West Seattle Herald posed some other questions to SDOT and got these responses:

Why are there no architectural renderings of a project of this size?

Full architectural renderings are quite expensive-approximately \$2,500 to \$10,000 per rendering. In order to help control costs for this project, we have not included architectural renderings in the project scope. To help communicate the look and feel of the design, we have created plant palettes, landscaping plans, and photos of existing projects that include similar elements to what we're proposing. The use of these visual tools, especially photos, are an effective means of communicating the look and feel of the design of a transportation project. Full architectural renderings are more typically used for new buildings that are unique and represent an interpretation of what the facility might look like, for which photos of similar projects are usually not available. The example images for the Fauntleroy Boulevard Project are easiest to access on the display boards and folio we displayed during the Walk and Talks;

With Whole Foods now not going into the Whittaker project won't you have to conduct a new traffic study once they find a new tenant or tenants?

We are in the middle of conducting a revised traffic study to look at impacts to vehicle travel times on Fauntleroy between S.W. Alaska Street and 35th Avenue S.W. once the project is built and open, in 2019. To project traffic conditions and volumes, our model includes projected traffic volumes for current construction and permitted construction developments, like





How the Whittaker project handles deliveries is part of the review process for the development. If operations for this space drastically changes than what was approved for the Whole Foods development, it will go through a new review process for proposed operations.

With a wide median in the roadway and only one lane in each direction how do emergency vehicles get through?

We have coordinated the design of the Fauntleroy Way Boulevard S.W. project with the Seattle Fire Department, and the design has their concurrence. There are multiple emergency vehicle routes in and out of West Seattle, and Fauntleroy is one of those routes. Other routes in the area include S.W. Alaska St, 35th Avenue S.W., and S.W. Avalon St. The Fire Dept. also uses 38th Avenue S.W., and we've designed the intersection at Fauntleroy Way S.W. and 38th Avenue S.W. based on input we had received from them.





don't know why I love quotes about beavers. My favorite is from a woman who had a run-in with one on her property, "I've lost all respect for beavers," she was quoted as saying about the incident.

Let me go on record, I will never lose my respect for beavers. Have you seen their work by the pond at Golden Gardens lately? Which brings me to my second favorite quote (regarding the animal not any of the high school teams), "the beavers always win." I recall that was a response from Seattle Parks in a 2014 interview.

Between the first settlers who logged

Ballard for timber, and the large rodents who started and continue it, I would never bet against a beaver. In fact Ballard High School's choice of the beaver as mascot could be a sign of its brilliance. Which brings us to the Golden Beavers. Hello BHS Class of '67. You can finally join the Golden Beavers Association.

If you're doing the math it's obvious that membership begins when the graduating class is in its 50th year. Meanwhile the Golden Beavers Association celebrates its 30th anniversary luncheon. However to throw off our calculations the association was established by the Class of 1936 (but in 1987). The primary focus was, and is, to provide scholarships for deserving Ballard High School seniors.

On April 29, 2017 the Golden Beavers Association will hold their 30th scholarship luncheon, and if you're a Golden Beaver you should be there.

Vice-President Dick Mitchell '51 had passed along the Spring 2017 (Volume 31, No. 1) issue of The Golden Beaver Log, the association's official news publication. I started reading the class notes and decided to call a few longtime contributors to find out if they were going to be attending the luncheon.

I started with the Class Secretary for the graduating class of 1933, Margie Nelson Conover. Her son answered the telephone for her and when I asked for her said, "My mom is 102 years old you know."

I apologized because I mistakenly thought she was only 101, but she'd had a birthday in February since submitting her class notes. Conover lives at Ballard Landmark, the address for quite a few Golden (and not yet Golden) Beavers. Her additional class representative, Katherine (Kate) Blomeke Herndon, also lives there. Rather sadly they announced in Class News, "This is our swan song communiqué and we wish you all the best."

Conover made a particular effort to keep up with others from their class through letter writing. "But so many have moved to California or are deceased," she said. In the class notes for 1933 Conover and Herndon wrote, "Both of us are 101 years old and still on the go…However, Ballard has been displaced by cranes, condos, trucks and coffee houses."

Conover expressed interest in attending the lunch but said she didn't have anyone to go with. I could hear her son in the background, asking the date of the luncheon.

Next I spoke with Elizabeth Higgins, the eldest child of Caroline Heck Haga '36, a member of the founding class. Higgins and her husband have recently moved in with her mother in Bothell, as Haga doesn't drive anymore. "She'll definitely be at the luncheon," Higgins assured me. "She's a big supporter and has been on the scholarship committee."

On the advice of my friend Gerry Hansen '49, I reached out to Karin Gorud Scovill


'44. She's too busy to attend the luncheon this year as she's clearing out her home for her sale, after relocating to Ida Culver. "It is a wonderful span of years," she said of Golden Beavers, commenting on news of graduates dating to 84 years earlier. Scovill still does monthly lunches with other Ballard ladies from her graduating class and loves the achievements of the Golden Beavers Association. "It keeps the good work going," she said of their scholarships.

Independently class reunions get planned, the Board of Directors meets quarterly. A committee reviews scholarship applications and The Golden Beaver Log is published twice a year. Their dues are \$25.00/year of \$100 for a lifetime membership. I hope members of the Class of 1933 went for lifetime membership.

In terms of community, longevity and thirty years of good works, I rest my case. The Beavers always win.
